



Global Leadership Training Programme for Sustainable Development in Africa

31 January – 8 March 2024

Course Overview

This document lays out an 8-module curriculum focusing on Global Leadership Training Programme for Sustainable Development in Africa offered by UNU-IAS in collaboration with New York University and the University of Johannesburg, for postgraduate students working in international development with an interest in Africa. This certificate-bearing institute will provide an opportunity for participants with wide and diverse interests in Africa and sustainable development studies to learn from African leaders about *innovative leadership, democracy, civic engagement and public policy*. The online program includes lectures, workshops, resources, and activities prepared by scholars and practitioners in a range of fields (e.g., health, education, technology, environmental studies, governance, law/human rights, NGOs/CSOs) from the public and private sectors across Africa. A variety of online teaching modalities and resources will help participants consider a variety of leadership approaches undertaken across disciplines and fields, and strategies that they employ to strengthen community and civil society engagement, build and enhance human rights, and contribute to sustainable development across Africa.

The goals for this program are:

- Creating opportunities to engage with African leaders across fields and disciplines (health, education, environment, governance, technology, human rights, etc.) to learn from their leadership skills and understand the strategies they are using to promote sustainable development initiatives, particularly the SDGs.
- Building a network of Asian and African and development practitioners (faculty, researchers, staff and graduate students) who might begin to work together in a diverse range of organizations in and across the continent to support and enhance the SDGs and research priorities.
- Creating learning opportunities for all participants to discuss some best practices in

governance, community mobilization, public management and social innovation; assess their relevance to a range of African contexts; and apply as appropriate.

- Building agenda-setting, strategic-planning, and community-engagement skills to build ethical, relevant and context-specific development practitioners; develop skills that further each participant’s professional learning objectives and address key development planning needs.

Course Schedule at a Glance

The course consists of 8 online modules with content provided in an online portal (Moodle). Each module will include a variety of materials (e.g., topical videos, power points with audio lectures and relevant readings) that will be available online and downloadable to participants. Participants will also meet online approximately three times per week for a 2-hour online engagement in a synchronous face to face format led by the co-instructors and with guest presenters from various countries and industries.

This programming draws heavily from the expertise of a range of professionals across the African continent and interdisciplinary development practitioners, combining insights from

experiences in education, health, environmental studies and government. In addition, these sessions will inform participants about the realities African leaders face leading their organizations in various contexts, cultures and countries. While the course is online all face-to-face sessions will be highly interactive and draw on the participants' and presenters' experiences, strengths/challenges, and successes in each area in their sector and country. The goal is for participants to learn from each other as well as from faculty and guest presenters. In addition to team building, we will introduce concrete skills for development practitioners to work with and support initiatives that promote civil societies, engaged communities and flourishing locally sustainable economies.

Program Requirements and Grading

Regular attendance, participation and reading of the materials are expected. Engagement with discussions during the lectures and on the Moodle discussion board is also expected. You will be asked to write a 5-page interdisciplinary research concept note/project proposal drawn from information in the lectures and readings and with input from at least two professionals in your area of work. You are encouraged to collaborate with other program members on the concept note/project proposal.

The Certificate of Completion will be based primarily on the following criteria and activities:

1. Participation in all lectures (a minimum of 7 out of 9 sessions are required). Please let us know if you cannot attend for any reason.
2. Weekly video or written contributions to the discussion board (see the weekly activities tab in each session).
3. Introduction to/solicit advice from at least two leaders/scholars in your field/from this program on your project proposal.
4. Write a 5-page concept note or project proposal with team members.
5. Present group proposal at the end of the course.
